What is a hazardous material?

A substance that produces or may produce momentary or permanent damage to human, animal or vegetal health, and to property and/or the environment.

What is a hazardous materials emergency?

A situation caused by or involving a hazardous material which produces an alteration in people, property, services or the environment, leading to the deployment of specialized first responders.

IF THERE IS A HAZARDOUS MATERIAL EMERGENCY NEAR YOUR HOME OR CURRENT LOCATION:

Leave the area immediately and move approximately two blocks away (200 meters).



If you have any unusual symptom or discomfort, contact Salud Responde (Ministry of Health Help Desk) 600 360 7777 or seek for medical treatment at the pearest health service.



Once you are in a safe location, call the emergency services and direct them to the affected area. Dial 132 for the Fire Service. Dial 133 for Carabineros (Chilean National Police Force). If the emergency takes place in the sea, lake or river, dial 137 for DIRECTEMAR.



Remain in a safe place and do not return until authorities indicate it is safe to do so.



Stay away from the area and follow instructions from the authorities.

It is possible to identify hazardous materials by the following symbols:
